Agriculture and Self-Sustainability

Don Bosco Agricultural Colleges Community Programs aim to assist locals to improve sustainable food availability through enhancing traditional farming methods. In most developing countries a high proportion of the population are subsistence farmers. The Agricultural Colleges support local farmers by demonstrating techniques to increase crop productivity, whilst students are taught ways to better care for livestock through practical experience. Obtaining local food security goes a long way in combating poverty and helping youth build a better future for themselves, their families and their nation.

Emergency Relief

With a global presence in 134 countries, Salesians are well positioned to provide in consultation with the local community and organisations, direct aid and relief in times of natural disasters and humanitarian emergencies. By launching special fundraising Appeals, Salesian Missions can support programs that relieve famine in Africa, rebuild earthquake damaged schools in Nepal and Ecuador, assist flood victims in India, house internally displaced people in South Sudan, provide education, food and supplies in the face of pandemics and so much more.

The Ukraine Relief effort continues by focusing on making it safe for children to go to school in the Ukraine and also providing relief to those that have little access to food and supplies. We are pleased to say that over \$428,000 has been raised to support the relief effort.

The civil unrest in the DR Congo combined with food shortages experienced throughout the Horn of Africa is a real concern. The Don Bosco Network has mobilized to provide a co-ordinated approach in communicating the greatest need. PROGRAM ACTIVITIES

2022 THE YEAR IN REVIEW

The Ukraine Relief effort to assist refugees was a dominate focus in 2022. The Don Bosco Network (DBN) mobilized providing both information and a common point of contact to receive the information required to inform our donors. With the relief effort co-ordinated from Poland, it was reassuring that a focused approach was carried out to ensure all proposed projects were approved and prioritized. The demands for emergency relief continued in 2023 with the unrest in DR Congo and the Syrian Earthquake.

Our Salesian partners are involved mostly in continuing projects for youth – work that has been established in response to local needs which include schools that care for marginalised street children and orphans. A major purpose in the Don Bosco Schools is to offer job related skills to youth enabling them to find gainful employment.

Requests for funding frequently involve help with the running costs of schools especially when local Government funding has declined. Assistance is needed to help with salaries, classroom materials, repair. and maintenance of buildings.



VIETNAM – 14% LIVE IN POVERTY

With generous fundraising activities organised by various groups our work in Vietnam has continued, providing food

staples for flood victims and others who are on the poverty line. Children have been given the opportunity to attend school by having their tuition covered whilst others have been granted scholarships for higher education purposes. The elderly in one of the Nursing homes were visited and given small gifts and some wheelchairs were donated.

Salesian schools, services and programs throughout Vietnam are helping to break the cycle of poverty while giving many young people hope for a more positive and productive future. Salesian vocational and technical schools equip students with the skills they need to compete in the local labour market by offering courses that lead to employment in construction, hotel management, electrical and mechanical engineering, computer science, and other fields. Many Salesian students are school dropouts seeking a second chance.

According to the World Bank, 14% of Vietnam's population lives in conditions of poverty. Rising levels of education and diversification into off-farm activities such as working in construction, factories or domestic housework have also contributed to reducing poverty in the country.

FIJI – A GATHERING PLACE FOR ALL TO ENJOY!

In Fiji the Don Bosco Youth and Education Centre located approx. 10km from Suva is a hub of activity with local youth gathering to learn, play and enjoy each other's company in a safe environment.

Approximately five hours drive from the Fijian Resorts that most Australians know, the centre is set amid settlements such as Muanikoso, where large families live in very basic dwellings. Local families welcome the Salesians into their homes and shared their stories of hardship and hope. With the minimum wage increasing from \$2.68 to \$4.00 FJD an hour, the costs of living remain a challenge.

The Don Bosco Youth and Education Centre is proving to be a great success amongst the local community and youth. It is now a usual occurrence every day to have over 200 young people flock to the Centre to enjoy games and activities with their friends and Salesian mentors. Young people of all different backgrounds, cultures and faiths are joining the programs and they aim to ensure that this youth centre and the programs are open to all who wish to join them.

The goal of the Youth Centre is to provide a place inclusive of all, to give young people the room to play safely, learn from each other, celebrate their culture and have fun. It is pleasing to see that young people of all different backgrounds, cultures and faiths are joining the programs.

Programs are currently being established with the involvement and inspiration from the local community. Youth Leadership Programs have been conducted to provide a platform where voices are heard, education is provided, and ideas are discussed.

The need for the variety of programs is very real as families from remote country areas relocate into Suva seeking employment. Children are left to occupy their time on the streets when not in school and left idle.

The second stage of the build; to develop the surrounding land is well underway. While taking the opportunity during a break in the wet weather, a netball/basketball/volleyball court was laid. Further work in the fields and outside lighting will be erected in the future.



SAMOA - EDUCATION IS THE KEY

An **overwhelming challenge** for our two Don Bosco Schools in Samoa is to **equip teachers** with the necessary resources they require to **educate students**. It is for this reason that we have launched a campaign to "Sponsor a Teacher, Educate a Nation".

With a focus on vocational learning, both Don Bosco schools together with the wider community know exactly how important is for the youth in Samoa to gain the necessary qualifications and skills to **obtain employment and a career**. It is through strong leadership and inspirational teachers that hope is born and underprivileged youth can create a brighter future. Through the Salesian Bulletin and social media, we will be highlighting inspirational teachers and staff that are making an impact in their specific fields.

Funds from this campaign will provide our schools in Samoa with the **resources**, **materials**, **teacher support and training** required so that students in Samoa will have the best possible chance of success. Our many dedicated teachers guide their young people daily to become productive contributors in their families, community, and their nation. The school takes a holistic approach to education, building confidence, self-esteem, teamwork in students, as well as the celebration of culture through song, dance and storytelling.

Don Bosco Technical Centre has embraced their new hospitality building which opened Feb 2021. Teachers have journeyed with the students to not only teach them the skills to translate into a career but also educate them on the importance of nutrition. To ensure the sustainability of the program, a garden has been established to grow the produce. Students then prepare and cook the items which are made available for students to purchase for lunch.

Don Bosco Technical Centre, Alafua offers a vocational education comprising of a three-year course. All first-year students experience a combination of trades including plumbing, motor mechanics, carpentry, and hospitality. In following years, students specialise in a trade offering an Accredited Certificate in their chosen field. The school also promotes personal, moral and spiritual growth, leadership skills development and teamwork through cultural and sporting activities.

Don Bosco Technical Centre in Alafua not only offers traditional trade courses, it also offers a Fine Arts program as part of the sustainable development of the school. Through community and government qualifications board consultations the school has adapted its courses to fill the future needs of the job market. The Fine Art program works closely with construction, welding and sewing to create carvings, furniture, art, stone carvings and much more. In 2023 a new Fale (outdoor structure) was built with the generosity of \$20,000 raised by Salesian College Chadstone during their Don Bosco Oratory week celebrations. The new Art Fale has enabled the ability to have a separate learning space for each of the three-year groups.



Timor Leste

Timor Leste is located northwest of Darwin and has celebrated 20 years of independence. However, economically it remains one of the poorest countries in Southeast Asia. With a population of just over 1.3mil it is estimated that about 40% live in poverty.



Don Bosco Salesian Schools, Technical and Vocational Training Centres are making an impact by providing young people with the education and skills to obtain employment and actively participate in the development of their nation. The emphasis on education through the many Don Bosco Schools and Technical Centres in Timor Leste continues as they accompany students and community groups to provide the skills needed to 'break the cycle' of poverty.

The Don Bosco Boys Orphanage, Lospalos and the Sisters Orphanages in both Laga and Venilale continue to provide children with a home, education in the nearby schools and a secure environment where they can learn

life skills and enjoy time with their friends. With nutritional meals provided daily to over 300 children, finding the funds to subsidize the running costs is always a challenge. The Salesian Sisters Orphanage in the mountainous region of Venilale, is home to 100 girls from the ages 6-16 who attend the local Salesian Schools. Funds were sent to make covers for 120 mattresses and provide food and running costs.

The Sisters' Medical Clinic, Venilale, continues to supply essential medical care for mothers, babies and the poor. Caring for the rural 13 surrounding villages is always demanding, especially when providing patients with the treatment and medicines they require. Patients turn to the assistance of the clinic as pharmacies are not common in these areas. Offering nutritional advice during consultations is given as well as dispensing powered milk to malnourished babies.





Don Bosco Agricultural College, Fuiloro prepares students by teaching them more productive food methods along with better care of livestock. As the school building was old and needed continual maintenance, we are pleased to report that all classrooms are now operational with the much-needed replacement of the ceilings and roof. In Fuiloro 80% of the community earn their living through farming. The Don Bosco Agricultural school gives students the opportunity to learn both efficient horticulture and animal husbandry by combining old and new technology with agricultural science. Produce is used both to feed the school boarders and to sell to the community.

With the support of the O'Brien Foundation Australia, two new classrooms are being constructed at the Don Bosco Technical School in Fatumaca and an upgrading of the electrical course to include Solar Panel installations at Don Bosco Maliana.

Don Bosco Training Centre in Comoro offer trade courses of certificate level one and two in General Constructions, Mechanics, and Computer Administration. The Centre is accredited by the National Trade Qualifications and accredited for preparing construction students to work in Australia. Each year upon successful completion of the courses approx. 200 students gain employment in local organisations and work in Australia.

An essential part of the school programs is to provide scholarships to marginalised youth from poor families who otherwise would not have the opportunity to an education. This can only happen with donors' generosity. It is with grateful thanks we acknowledge The Ron Archer Foundation for providing scholarships to students at Don Bosco Comoro, St Jude's Parish, Langwarren and Friends of Luro for sponsoring students at the Don Bosco Agricultural School in Fuiloro and Michael Parker Foundation who funded students at Fatumaca.

In May 2023 a container filled with goods was shipped to Timor Leste and we especially thank the Men's Shed group co-ordinated by Jim Finlayson for providing large quantities of refurbished tools to be transported to assist with many school courses, building and gardening projects.

Throughout India the Salesians of Don Bosco are making a positive impact by continuing to focus on the care of street children, education for all, building strong communities through local collaboration, the empowerment of minority groups and providing opportunities in remote villages.

Fr Thomas Vattukulam was pleased to report that the Bangalore Mission supported the "Rainwater Harvesting" program at the Don Bosco College by supplying large tanks. At Don Bosco Mithra school, educational stationery and uniforms were supplied to disadvantaged children as well as scholarships to help continue their studies. In addition, school furniture was provided to schools in North Karnataka and children were sponsored under the 'Save a Life Programme" at Don Bosco Mysore.

In Bangalore the empowerment of local voices continues to be encouraged to assist individuals and communities to negotiate factors that impact their lives and livelihoods. Child labour is discouraged by offering education and this process is at the heart of all social work. It is part of a means to support vulnerable children and communities on their journey to equality. These groups provide a platform for social support and assistance, a space to learn new skills and an agent to support negotiations of rights.

During World Environment Day, Don Bosco Salesians in Bangalore successfully facilitated a program to promote Living Sustainably in Harmony with Nature across 15 districts in Karnataka. 1928 saplings of various fruit and other trees were planted by 9987 children.

In Mumbai, Fr Edwin D'Souza reports that in partnership with local agencies, Don Bosco support for "street children" projects include the delivery of education and technical training programs accompanied with life coping skills to enhance future employment opportunities. In over 20 villages, before school Education Programs and tuition lessons are conducted to help children prepare for their day's classes. An assessment is made of the student's educational level and support is given accordingly.

In the provinces of Gujarat and Maharashtra, tribal villages benefit from self-help projects including the establishment of small poultry and goat farming business to enable remote communities earn an income and provide food in these drought-stricken areas.

The Youth Peace Convention was held in Guwahati and attended by 350 youth leaders. Training, knowledge, and experiences were shared with the aim to prevent violence and work towards peaceful social cohesion that involves negotiation and reconciliation.

AFRICA

A renewed focus on the Horn of Africa has commenced as ongoing conflict, civil unrest and difficult climate conditions continues to propagate food shortages and refugee displacement in the region. Salesians are actively welcoming refugees, distributing food and essentials reaching thousands of families as they migrate to safer locations.

Ethiopia

Ethiopia's internal conflict within the Tigray region continues to present many challenges. Salesians are working

with locals in delivering basic needs such as food, emergency shelter, medical supplies and hygiene facilities. For these vulnerable people, the ability to prepare food, store water and sleep safely goes a long way to improving their health status.

Br Bullo wishes to thank donors for their unconditional support, encouragement and welcomes prayers to help alleviate the suffering of many.

South Sudan

The situation in South Sudan is critical as over 10,000 displaced people have been living in camps since 2013 with

only basic shelters made from wood and whatever materials that can be found.

We were pleased to assist with the purchase of waterproof sheeting to cover these refuges as the rainy season has commenced. Education remains a priority and is offered at the Don Bosco schools in Gumbo, Juba. Students residing in the camp are supplied with school stationery, materials, uniforms and sporting equipment. The children benefit from playing games in a safe environment, enjoy team sports and laugh together amid so much poverty and uncertainty.

In addition to the Camp, Don Bosco Gumbo has opened its doors to approximately 4,000 children and youth in its schools. There are two kindergartens, two primary-middle schools, an "accelerated elementary school", a secondary school and vocational training centre which offers various courses to train in electricity, mechanics, stoneworks-masonry, solar panel technician, welder and computer studies for 700 young people.

There is also now a Salesian Medical Clinic, a Women's Promotion Centre and Sports Camps to keep the children active and engaged.

Uganda

Located 30km from the border of South Sudan in Uganda, Salesians reside within the Palabek Refugee Settlement and have recently been instrumental in finding ways to supplement decreasing food rations

available for the World Food Program. With more than 76 000 refugees within the community and a hive of activity at the camp's Vocational Training Centre, there is now 92 acres of Maize, Soya Bean, and Sunflower Crops that are attended to by 25 agriculture groups. Fr. Uba says 'the agriculture groups are very important



because they enable those involved to contribute to their families, supplement food rations and restore dignity'.

Beyond necessities and nutrition, the Salesians are also seeking to meet the human needs of those who have been displaced. Salesian Missions Australia was able to fund the installation of two Maize processing machines, purchased through donations. The community continues to develop its agriculture programs in order to supplement recent food shortages in the Horn of Africa.

SUPPORT FOR UKRAINE

With the new phase of the conflict and the change of its scale and impact, a crisis continues in Ukraine and the surrounding countries as Salesians of Don Bosco support refugees and prepared for the extremely cold winter months. This year is particularly challenging with the loss of livelihoods. disruption to supply chains. insufficient electricity and fuel, the loss of housing and damage to infrastructure. Α transfer \$86.000 assisted with coats,



clothing, blankets, heating equipment and housing as a priority.

Truckloads of food and medicine were sent to the Ukrainian boarder and distributed to smaller towns, where people were waiting and often dependent on this form of aid. The situation remains tense in many places so travel with bulletproof vests is required.

Refugees from Ukraine migrated to Poland, Czech Republic, Slovakia, Slovenia and other surrounding areas. We are fortunate to have Salesian communities in these countries that are working together to co-ordinate the relief efforts. Many Salesians, staff and volunteers did their best to accommodate and direct the refugees to find a place to live, go to school and find jobs. We thank Viatores Cum Christo for sponsoring the refurbishment and renovation of ten self-contained rooms for refugees in Poland. This will be used as short stay accommodation while refugees transition to a more permanent location.

The priorities for the short and mid-term future are the challenges of education as classes are in the language of the host country or online in Ukrainian. Social support is provided to many who are suffering the consequences of severe trauma, particularly where psychiatric help is hard to access.



Bosco Salesians, staff and volunteers in Ukraine continue to assist locals who have been cut off due to the war with welcomed food, clothing, supplies and other essential needs. Recently we have been asked to partner with overseas Salesians to redevelop a bunker to shelter 750 people during bomb raids. This space will later be used as an education centre, however, for the present it will offer a safe place to the locals. As other urgent needs come to hand we will endeavour to support the relief efforts.

PRINCIPLES AND ACCOUNTABILITY

PROGRAM ACCOUNTABILITY

Salesian Missions Australia has in place stringent standards for accountability and transparency both in its domestic organisation and for overseas partners. We insist that all our Overseas Partners be accountable for the funds they receive from our office. All Partners are required to sign a Partners Agreement which also enforces the need to be aware of our Policies and Guidelines and integrate these compliance documents into their operations. CHILD PROTECTION

Salesian Missions Australia Child Safeguarding Policy was established in 2010 and reviewed in 2017 and 2020. It has been implemented locally; each member of staff has a copy and the mandatory police checks completed.

Our Overseas Partners subscribe to our Child Safeguarding Policy and are informed of the requirements for the safety and best interests of children;

- the rights of the child are paramount;
- compliance is mandatory; and
- the local Provincials of the Salesians and the Salesian Sisters will oversee its administration.

All Overseas Partners are required to "sign off" on the Child Safeguarding Policy as a condition of receiving funds.

The Child Safeguarding Policy (CSP) has been well received by all our Partners. Our Partners in Salesian orphanages, schools and community centres are required to ensure that their staff are well briefed and educated on safeguarding. They conduct regular training programs and run sessions for students on their rights, responsibilities and ability to speak out.

PRIVACY

We are committed to protecting the privacy of donors and correspondents. Any information provided to us remains private and confidential. Our contact list is not rented, sold or exchanged.



GENDER EQUITY

Salesian Missions Australia is committed to a policy of equal opportunity in employment and accepts that it has a responsibility to create an environment free of discrimination, victimisation, sexual harassment and vilification - in accordance with the articles of the Victorian Equal Opportunity Act (1995) regarding staff appointments and management, and with the Salesian Society (Vic) Inc. Financial Snapshot

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activities of the Fund during the year were:

- the provision of financial assistance for ongoing projects in developing countries for the benefit of the underprivileged, especially the young; and
- the provision of aid directly to people in need of relief.

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

Salesian Missions Australia is owned and operated by Salesian Society (Vic) Inc. It attracts support from donors all over Australia. Total revenue raised in 2022 for overseas development work was \$2,420,198, an increase of \$228,053 on donations received in the previous year. This is mainly due to an increase in donations for victims of the Ukraine War. Also an increase in the funds received through bequests.

Total expenditure was \$2,197,881 which consisted of transfers to overseas partners and various administrative costs. There is \$1,216,622 available for distribution in 2022.

The operating result for the year ended December 31, 2021 increased by \$222,317 as a greater amount of funds were received from donors.

With regard to expenditure: There has been little variation over the years in the funds allocated for (i) development and education, (ii) relief and rehabilitation and (iii) religious purposes. Every effort is made to keep administration costs low.



- Articles in the Salesian Bulletin and Catholic Press.


Income vs Expenditure (000)

DONORS' WISHES

More than 90 per cent of the donations received by Salesian Missions Australia are earmarked for destinations specified by the donor.

Most donations are for the reduction of poverty through development via education in schools and vocational training centres, the provision of technical services and resources etc.

Donations are received from some donors for non-development activity, which, in our context is for religious purposes, such as the education and training of clergy and/or the building of churches.

Salesian Missions Australia has formalised its long-standing practice regarding donations and has drawn up specific guidelines, which, in summary are:

- All donations are receipted.
- Donations for humanitarian relief and development are tax deductible.
- Funds received for religious purposes are clearly delineated, do not qualify for tax deductibility and are clearly delineated in the financial documents and communications.
- Salesian Missions will not accept donations for political purposes.
- Donor forms are clearly marked to indicate the intention of the donation.

OUR VALUES

As Salesians we draw our inspiration from Catholic Social Teaching.

Human dignity - We recognise the sacredness of life and that every person has inherent dignity and worth. Our human rights and responsibilities are founded in this essential, shared human dignity.

The common good - We have responsibility for one another in our life together, and are called to work for the common good of all. We advocate for a just society in which all people, particularly the vulnerable and marginalised, are able to flourish and meet their needs.

Subsidiarity and Participation - The capacity and capabilities of people and communities ought to be respected, with decisions made at the lowest local level possible. Everyone should have the opportunity to participate in and contribute to decision processes that closely affect them.

Solidarity - Humans are social by nature and depend on one another. We seek to stand in unity with each other, particularly those who are powerless or disadvantaged, and recognise each persons' rights regardless of national, religious, ethnic, economic, political and ideological differences.

Preferential care for the poor - Caring for the poor is the responsibility of all, the needs of the socially disadvantaged and vulnerable are to be prioritised.

Economic justice – Life is not solely meant for profit, but rather in service of the entire human community. All that are capable should be involved in economic activity and should be able to draw from work, the means for providing for themselves and their family.

Stewardship of creation - We care for the earth, recognising that all of creation is inter-connected and we are part of and dependent on the environment. Pope Francis has recently referred to this as integral ecology.

These principles are the basis of our dedication to the preservation and protection of Human Rights for all in accordance to a Human Rights Based Approach: enabling people to realise their rights and assist those responsible for upholding such rights as equality, freedom from discrimination and access to education.
