#### THE YEAR IN REVIEW

2020 was a challenging year for Salesian Missions Australia – a year in which the need for greater financial resources were highlighted by the growing requests received for assistance from our overseas partners as Covid-19 took hold and had a varied impact on many of our partners.

Our Salesian partners are involved mostly in continuing projects for youth – work that has been established in response to local needs which include schools that care for marginalised street children and orphans. A major purpose in the Don Bosco Schools is to offer job related skills to youth enabling them to find gainful employment.

Requests for funding frequently involve help with the running costs of schools especially when local Government funding has declined. Assistance is needed to help with salaries, classroom materials, repair and maintenance of buildings.

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## **NEW 'YOUTH and EDUCATION CENTRE' for FIJI**

We are pleased to report that the construction of the Youth and Education Centre, Suva, Fiji is now in the final stages of completion. The contractors are in the process of finishing the toilet block, mezzanine level, kitchen facilities and external drainage. This project which includes a multipurpose community space, open areas for learning and a community garden; will help create a central hub where young people will be able to meet in a safe environment as they walk accompanied by their peers and their Salesian mentors to expand their life skills.

In recent months, in between lockdowns, it has been wonderful to see the hall being used for large social community gatherings and celebrations over Christmas and Easter. The Community Garden is going extremely well with locals using the space to grow garden produce to feed their families. To ensure the sustainability of the hall, the Fijian Salesian Community have constructed a plan for the hall to be hired outside the youth outreach hours.

The Salesians "outreach" into the community after the lockdowns are continuing by visiting vulnerable families and listening to their challenges during this time. Some families are experiencing cutbacks to hours worked while others remain unemployed.

Stage two is to clear the surrounding land to build a netball/basketball/volleyball court and a rugby field where Fijian youth can enjoy time with their friends. This is an important part of the Youth and Community programs to encourage holistic development of young people. Br. Peter Minh Duc

Nguyen explains, "In general, in many places in Fiji, the young don't have a safe place to play. Young people play rugby, volleyball, and other sports on the road and this is very dangerous. The need for a protected and healthy playground is an urgent need. The Youth program fulfils that demand and helps them to develop the whole person by exploring different activities."

Parish priest Fr Mikaere Leilua is overseeing the project and expresses his deep gratitude to all donors. The project is now in its final stages of completion having suffered setbacks related to wet weather and delays, however it is now full steam ahead!





### SAMOA:

Over the past forty years, the Salesians of Don Bosco have been working alongside the local community to improve the lives and futures of young people throughout Samoa.

Since 1988, Don Bosco Technical College (DBTC) Alafua, Samoa is known for offering a quality skills-based education to disadvantaged youth. They take pride in offering a second chance to students who have not completed mainstream schooling due to poverty, family and social issues.

On completion of the 3-year trades course graduates are well placed to find decent jobs to assist their families and develop a fulfilling career.

After the successful transition to a co-educational school in 2020, DBTC currently has the largest number of

enrolments for many years with over 40 girls and 180 first year students alone. The introduction of a new hospitality course is expected to provide all students with job opportunities within local industries.

With the assistance of the Australian High Commission Office in Samoa, 20 sewing machines were purchased. The

School also introduced a very successful 10 week evening sewing course open to the local community; they are now on their 3rd rotation.

After the successful transition to a co-educational school in 2020, DBTC currently has the largest number of enrolments for many

years with over 40 girls and 180 first year students alone.

Ms Farene a second-year student is happy with her choice to specialise in plumbing, "I felt that plumbing is my calling. I want to get a job to help my family as they're not well off and I want to help them in any way I can." Ms Farene encourages young girls who want to become plumbers in the future "to go for it and don't hold back."

Don Bosco College and Vocational Technical Centre Salelologa, Savai'i is very important for the future livelihoods of young people, as Savai'i is essentially still comprised of subsistence farmers. There is a growing tourism business on the island and the College is providing qualifications in Cert.1 Hospitality to expand on job opportunities for locals. The College is an important Community Centre where, outside school hours, its facilities are used for multipurpose events.

Although Samoa has remained free of Coronavirus infections, the pandemic has had a detrimental impact on the already fragile Samoan economy. Boarder closures have crippled the tourism industry of which many families rely on for their livelihood. Many students are finding it difficult to pay schools fees and in turn the schools struggle to meet operating costs. We are so thankful to benefactors who enable the good work of both the schools to continue.

Don Bosco College and Vocational Technical Centre is also offering an accredited Certificate I in Trades Foundation Skills as part of their program. The course is in its first year of implementation and upon completion the graduating students are ready to tackle challenges in the workforce. Students had the opportunity to showcase their products consisting of dressers, coffee tables, beds and cabinets to their families and community.

"It is with great joy and gladness that we have accomplished this part of the programme. We would like to thank those who sponsored this project, our Australian supporters. We are grateful that our students have accomplished and learned new skills and gained knowledge which was our goal," said Principal, Father Nukuluve.

#### **Timor Leste**

The Salesian Priests, Brothers and Sisters are making significant contributions in Timor Leste through their schools, orphanages, training centres and medical clinic. Education remains the key to helping individuals acquire skills for better living and allows them to actively participate in the development of their country. The Salesians tireless work is highly valued and continues making a real difference.



Don Bosco Co-educational Technical High School, Maliana, is an important social and educational centre for meetings and youth gatherings. The School, with boarding facilities, offers a three year Diploma course in General Electricity. After school, the students are encouraged to work in the vegetable garden, which provides food for the boarding home.

At Don Bosco Technical School Fatumaca, 200 students had the opportunity to specialise in building construction, mechanical, electrical installation, and electronic communications. The Radio and Television Stations remain a great success, providing work experience opportunities for the electronics students; broadcasting to villages within a 50km radius.

The focus of **St Anthony's High School Baucau** is the creation of a genuine centre of learning. The Luncheon Program continues to provide students with the nourishment they required to learn, especially for those students who walk long distances to school without breakfast.

With 95 boys, aged 6 – 16, the **Don Bosco Orphanage in Lospalos**, aims to educate boys to be self-disciplined, organised and live responsibly. This also includes those that come 'after school' to work in the vegetable garden.

With more than 75 per cent of the population deriving their livelihood from farming, **Don Bosco Agricultural College**, **Fuiloro** plays an important role in promoting better care of livestock and increasing the yield of crops. In 2020, the school continued to work towards becoming more self-sustainable by increasing farm production of corn, animal feed, horticultural and coconut oil.

The Maria Auxiliadora Medical Clinic remains the only facility to provide medical care to patients and villages in the Venilale district, their services are in great demand at this critical time. Funds are used to purchase medicines, milk powder for babies and salaries. Almost 9,000 patients are consulted each year, mainly for skin conditions, malnutrition and tuberculosis. The Clinic promotes health education classes in local schools and nearby villages while the mobile medical clinic services remote villages conducting health checks.

The Salesian Sisters Orphanages in Laga and Venilale cater for girls in need aged 6 – 16 with a home, education and a secure environment. Through 'integral education' incorporating studies such as theatre, dance, music, sewing and sport they encourage the development of their skills and talents.

The Womens Training Centre in Fuiloro offers courses in computing, basic office management and sewing. Students entering the program are mainly from rural poverty-stricken families. A high proportion of their graduates' secure work in Dili or Baucau.

In early 2020 a drought in East Timor impacted many parts of the country especially as they rely on subsistence farming for both food and income. Fr Trans from the **Don Bosco Agricultural College in Fuiloro** reported, "A long summer with very little rain has reduced both feed for the animals and produce for the community, boarders and surrounding villages. Due to the lack of reliable rain we were unable to sow corn this year and many of our plantings have dried up. This certainly will affect our ability to provide food. We have increased the volume of rice purchased which is very costly".





The situation in India is both overwhelming and frightening. Despite this, Salesians are doing their utmost to help the most affected and vulnerable by collaborating with other Aid Agencies to provide a co-ordinated response. With a greater need and a different focus, the Salesians work in India continues to bring aid and comfort to the 'poorest of the poor'.

The Don Bosco Schools in various locations have been transformed into quarantine centres to help those struggling with Covid-19 related issues.

In **Bangalore and Mumbai** food packages are being delivered to: Covid-19 patients who are treated at home, families who have lost their main income earner, migrant labourers and the marginalized of society. To minimise the spread of the virus fridges with food parcels have been placed on the roadside at central collection points for the needy. Covid-19 Care Centres have been established to assist those from the slums and where hygiene kits are being dispensed.

Volunteers including religious brothers and sisters are working in shifts in hospitals to assist where needed. These 'Covid Warriors' are trained by medical experts to assist the nurses and doctors. serve food and dispense medicine to Covid-19 patients in the general wards. (photo right - Covid Warrior Volunteers May 2021)



The Salesian Bangalore

Rural Educational Development Society (BREADS) in partnership with other agencies have initialised a "food to your doorstep" service free of cost for Covid-19 patients who are under quarantine. Education on the Covid-19 vaccination is provided and centres have been established in remote area to administer the vaccine.



Salesians in New Delhi, staff and volunteers have delivered groceries to over 700 families, with plans to reach 10,000 families in June. Financial assistance has been given to hundreds of displaced people to meet basic expenses including rent. Currently they are procuring oxygen tanks and beds for five charity hospitals who will provide free service to the needy as the lack of available treatment is the reason for so many deaths. With unemployment on the increase, Salesians in New Delhi are also running vocational training courses in sewing as a long-term strategy to build the self-sustainability of families.

Don Bosco Mumbai continue to provide relief to the people living in mountainous regions. This work becomes vital as the economic situation continues to decline by almost 24%. Don Bosco Development Society along with various partner organisations have successfully completed a Covid-19 food distribution project, assisting over 11,000 villagers and poor farmers. Salesians, staff and volunteers travelled to remote tribal villages in the hills, supporting thousands of people by providing food and hygiene kits during the pandemic. They also provided food kits to internal Indian migrants who were trying to return home due to the lockdown. The migrants endured a long wait of 3-4 weeks to access transport. Numerous special convoys were organised, however social distancing measures and the large number of people made the process slow and complicated.

We receive updates daily on the many worthwhile works that are carried out by Don Bosco Salesians. It is encouraging that so many are offering their time and efforts to alleviate the suffering of those most in need. We are very grateful for the financial assistance we have received from Australian donors to enable this good work to continue.

Sadly, we have been informed many Priests, Brothers and staff have died from contracting Covid-19. Our prayers are assured for them and all of those affected.

The Salesian Community in Gumbo, South Sudan consists of a Parish, Technical-Vocational Training Center, Elementary and Middle Schools, Women's Promotion Center, Youth Center and an Internally Displaced Persons (IDP) Camp which was established in 2014 after the civil war. Don Bosco Salesians continue to support over 10,000 children, orphans, women and elderly IDP's with food, water, education, hygiene supplies and medical care.

Despite the difficulties during Covid-19, the regular distribution of much needed basic necessities to vulnerable families is welcomed. Salesians provide Covid-19 awareness education to refugees and the protocols of the Ministry of Health, to wash their hands often, maintain hygiene and body care.

The biggest fear is the real possibility of an epidemic in the camp. Tents are close: there is no room for social distancing. The camp is adjacent to several crowded local communities. It is impossible to prevent the flow of people between the camp and these communities.

Don Bosco Training Centre technical staff have volunteered to make and distribute metal stands for water tanks in their IDP Camps. This initiative is part of the support by Salesians towards containing the spread of Covid-19 among refugees.

Instability in the country remains high. Funding is inadequate and fails to meet the needs of all internally displaced people. South Sudan is a largely rural country with 80% of the population living in poverty, whilst more than a third of the population do not have access to food.



#### **ETHIOPIA:**

The Salesian communities continue to provide support to the local street children and vulnerable elderly over 14 educational and youth centres in 5 regions.

The current situation in Ethiopia has become extremely challenging with the country grappling with health, food, and social emergencies that are growing day by day. Covid-19 infections are increasing and add to the common active outbreaks of cholera, measles, and malaria. The country has also been the victim of a second wave of locusts, destroying hectares of much needed crops.

Covid-19 outreach programs conducted by the Salesians have provided health prevention tools and awareness training to more than 24,000 children and young people throughout the country. The distribution of hygiene materials, food and masks, is combined with the Covid-19 awareness to learn the basic safety measures to help minimize the spread. Marginalised groups have been severely impacted during the pandemic lockdown, leaving them at greater risk of infection and malnutrition.

**Don Bosco Mekanissa**, are supplying water to thousands of poor people living in slums, so they can wash their hands etc, thus contain the spread. The Salesians have repaired an old truck and 5,000 litre reservoir tank to transport water daily to the area.

Salesians remain focused on assisting poor malnourished children and destitute families with food, medicines, education and rehabilitation whilst also helping needy students in rural schools.

#### **PRIVACY**

We are committed to protecting the privacy of donors and correspondents. Any information provided to us remains private and confidential. Our contact list is not rented, sold or exchanged.

Salesians, Staff and Parents from Don Bosco Technical College Fatumaca, Timor Leste, receive training on safeguarding the rights of children and adhering to the expectations of Salesian Missions Australia Child Safeguarding Guidelines and Policy. A past student speaker explained the importance of building better relationships with students grounded in trust and respect. (Feb 2020)

#### PROGRAM ACCOUNTABILITY

Salesian Missions Australia has in place stringent standards for accountability and transparency both in its domestic organisation and for overseas partners. We insist that all our Overseas Partners be accountable for the funds they receive from our office. All Partners are required to sign a Partners Agreement which also enforces the need to be aware of our Policies and Guidelines and integrate these compliance documents into their operations. #### CHILD PROTECTION

Salesian Missions Australia Child Safeguarding Policy was established in 2010 and reviewed in 2017 and 2020. It has been implemented locally; each member of staff has a copy and the mandatory police checks completed.

Our Overseas Partners subscribe to our Child Safeguarding Policy and are informed of the requirements for the safety and best interests of children;

- the rights of the child are paramount;
- compliance is mandatory; and
- the local Provincials of the Salesians and the Salesian Sisters will oversee its administration.

All Overseas Partners are required to "sign off" on the Child Safeguarding Policy as a condition of receiving funds.

The Child Safeguarding Policy (CSP) has been well received by all our Partners. Our Partners in Salesian orphanages, schools and community centres are required to ensure that their staff is well briefed and educated on safeguarding. They conduct regular training programs and run sessions for students on their rights, responsibilities and ability to speak out.



#### **GENDER EQUITY**

- the provision of financial assistance for ongoing projects in developing countries for the benefit of the underprivileged, especially the young; and
- the provision of aid directly to people in need of relief.

#### FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

Salesian Missions Australia is owned and operated by Salesian Society (Vic) Inc. It attracts support from donors all over Australia. Total revenue raised in 2020 for overseas development work was \$1,885,275, an increase of \$195,866 on donations received in the previous year. This is mainly due to an increase in general donations from the previous year.

Total expenditure was \$1,989,464 which consisted of transfers to overseas partners and various administrative costs. There was \$790,740 available for distribution in 2020.

The operating result for the year ended December 31, 2020 decline by \$104,189 as a greater amount of funds held were distributed to partners in need.

With regard to expenditure: There has been little variation over the years in the funds allocated for (i) development and education, (ii) relief and rehabilitation and (iii) religious purposes. Every effort is made to keep administration costs low.


Funds are raised by requests via -

- The annual Salesian Missions Newsletter.
- Direct mail to supporters of specific countries e.g. Pacific, Ethiopia, South Sudan, India and Timor-Leste.
- Fundraisers organised by supporters for a specific project.
- Fundraising activities in schools and special collections in parishes, however this was negatively impacted due to the lengthy Covid-19 lockdowns.
- Articles in the Salesian Bulletin and Catholic Press.

#### **DONORS' WISHES**

More than 90 per cent of the donations received by Salesian Missions Australia are earmarked for destinations specified by the donor.

Most donations are for the reduction of poverty through development via education in schools and vocational training centres, the provision of technical services and resources etc.

Donations are received from some donors for non-development activity, which, in our context is for religious purposes, such as the education and training of clergy and/or the building of churches.

Salesian Missions Australia has formalised its long-standing practice regarding donations and has drawn up specific guidelines, which, in summary are:

- All donations are receipted.
- Donations for humanitarian relief and development are tax deductible.
- Funds received for religious purposes are clearly delineated, do not qualify for tax deductibility and are clearly delineated in the financial documents and communications.
- Salesian Missions will not accept donations for political purposes.
- Donor forms are clearly marked to indicate the intention of the donation.

Funds amounting to \$1,606,543 were used for projects in Asia, Africa, Central & South America and the Pacific. \$54,668 was in the form of general donations, of this \$53,884 was for Development/Education and \$784 was for Non-Development purposes.

\$143,492 was received in Bequests for Development and Non Development Purposes.

#### iii Grants

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No Government or other grants were received by Salesian Missions Australia during 2020.

#### iv Investment Income

\$8,051 was received by Salesian Missions Australia during the year as interest on funds held and invested.

#### Other Income

\$48,600 was received during the year from the Federal Government in the form of Jobkeeper. A wage subsidy scheme paid to businesses who were significantly impacted by the lockdowns and impacts of Coronavirus, inorder to assist employers to continue paying their employees.
